Sermon Outlines Life in St. John's Gospel

"These were written . . . that believing ye might have life through his name." (John 20:31)

Nature speaks with one voice - the voice of Life. Life is also the deepest, fullest manifestation of Christianity, and, conversely, Christianity is the deepest, fullest manifestation of life. It is a justification and a fulfilment of life, and, like life itself, is a gift of God to man.

In the New Testament there are many phrases which include the word "life." To quote only a few of these, we are told to "walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:4); the Holy Spirit is called "the Spirit of life" (Rom. 8:2); and Christ is said to have been made a Priest "after the power of an endless life" (Heb. 7:16). Perhaps this emphasis on life is pre-eminently true of St. John's Gospel, as indicated by our text, which is part of the Book's conclusion or summing-up. We may therefore trace this principle of Divine Life step by step through the Gospel.

- *I. The Source of Life* (1:4)
 - 1. The fount and starting point "in him was life."
 - 2. Man's light from God's life "the life was the light of men."
- *II. The Beginning of Life* (4:14)
 - 1. The new birth "ye must be born again."
 - 2. The alternative death: "perish" (3:15, 16); "shall not see life" (3:36).
- *III. The Indwelling of Life* (4:14)
 - 1. Reception followed by realization "the water that I shall give him . . . everlasting life."
 - 2. Salvation followed by satisfaction "shall never thirst."
- *IV. The Permanence of Life* (5:24)
 - 1. Future as well as present and past.
 - a. "Shall not come into condemnation."
 - *b.* "*Hath* everlasting life."
 - c. "Hath passed out of death into life" (R.V.).
 - 2. Eternal in duration because eternal in quality.
- *V. The Sustenance of Life* (6:27, 33, 51))
 - 1. Physical life depends on absorption and assimilation of matter, making flesh and blood.
 - 2. Spiritual life, similarly, is sustained by Christ, the Living Bread.
- VI. The Abundance of Life (10:10)
 - 1. Not merely life, but as much life as possible "have it more abundantly."
 - 2. Not content with less or a difference of degree of warmth.
 - 3. A double blessing a soul saved from sin, and a heart secured for service.
- VII. The Condition of Life (11:25; 12:25)
 - 1. "The resurrection" comes before "the life". Our life is through the death and rising again of Christ.
 - 2. Relation between Christ's death and resurrection and ours (Cf. Rom. 6:10; 1 Cor. 15:22, 36; Eph. 2:1, 5).

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VIII. The Outcome of Life (15:5, 6, 8)

- 1. Abiding a great word of St. John (Cf. 5:38; 14:16)
- 2. Fruitfulness (Cf. Gal. 5:22, 23)

IX. The Glory of Life (17:2, 3)

- 1. The means of eternal life power of Christ (v. 2).
- 2. The essence of eternal life knowledge of God (v. 3).

Conclusion

Two classes of people: "quick" and "dead" - alive and asleep. Which are we?
